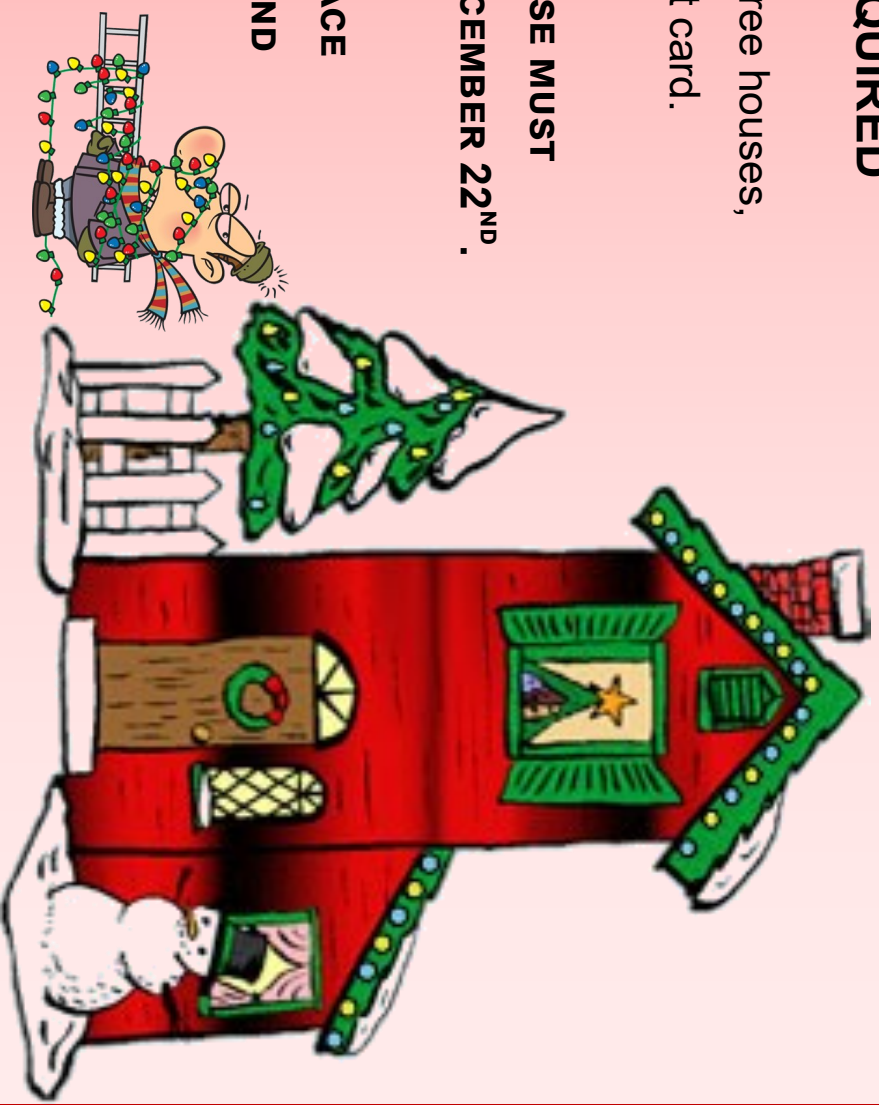
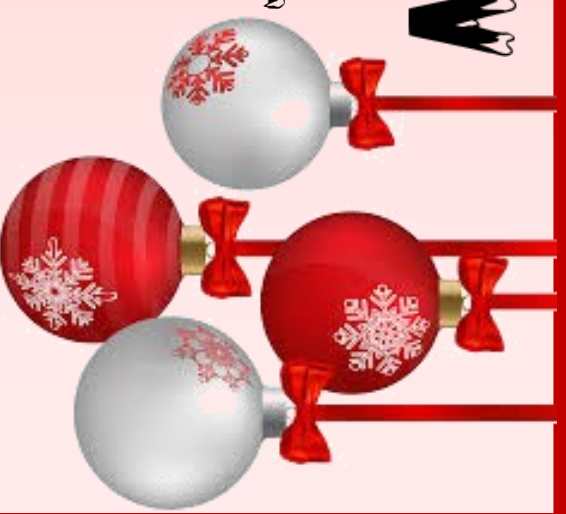

I would like to take a moment to remind everyone to have a safe and happy season.....

- While putting up the lights both inside and on the tree, check to make sure they are in good condition. Check for bare wires and missing bulbs. Be aware of how many sets you are connecting; you do not want to overload the circuit.
- Be careful where you run extension cords. You do not want to run an extension cord under a rug or
- through any doorways; they may crimp or become damaged with the closing of the door.
- If you have a live tree, remember to keep it watered.
- Watch the use of candles. Do not leave them burning unattended.
- Test your smoke detectors to make sure they are working.

How To Report Utility Issues

For Emergencies (Gas Leaks, Downed Power Lines, etc.)

For immediate safety hazards, the first step is to evacuate the area if necessary and then call emergency services and the utility provider's emergency hotline.

- **Natural Gas Leaks:**
 - Evacuate the area immediately.
 - From a safe distance, call **911** and your gas provider's emergency number:
 - **Nicor Gas:** 1-888-Nicor4U (1-888-642-6748)
- **Power Outages/Downed Lines:**
 - Stay away from downed power lines and assume they are energized.
 - Call **911** for downed power lines.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

LEAVING HOME DURING THE HOLIDAYS???

Just a reminder, the Forest View Police Department offers free house security checks if you're leaving town over the holidays. Please contact the Police Department at the non-emergency number 708-788-0318 for more information.

HOLIDAY GUESTS - PARKING

Parking on some streets in Forest View is "residential only". Therefore, should you have guests gathering at your home for the holidays please notify the Police Department at the non-emergency number 708-788-0318 when a non-resident visitor(s) will be parking on the street and then the vehicle(s) will not be ticketed. Also, residents are reminded that overnight parking on Village streets is prohibited. All vehicles must be off the street between the hours of 1 a.m. and 5 a.m.



HOLIDAY CRIME

Holidays are the easiest times for burglars to score. Once the house is empty, criminals know that you will be gone for hours, and that they don't have to rush to take all your precious property. Many burglaries occur on holidays such as Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, and the best one, believe it or not, is the Super Bowl. If you're not home when the game begins, you're probably not coming back until the game ends! Sad but true. See following holiday safety tips.

HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS

The holidays are a special and joyous time of year. Taking a few prevention measures can help keep your holiday season joyous. The following tips from the Forest View Police Department can help reduce your chances of becoming a victim of crime:

Be extra cautious about locking doors and windows when you leave the house, garage, or vehicle even for a few minutes.

When leaving home for an extended time, have a neighbor or family member watch your house, shovel snow, pick up the mail and newspapers. Indoor and outdoor lights should be on an automatic timer.

Leave a radio or television on so the house looks and sounds occupied.

Large displays of holiday gifts should not be visible through the windows and doors of your home.

Don't post travel plans on Facebook.

While on vacation, don't post vacation pictures on Facebook.

It is an honor to introduce myself as your new Chief of Police. It is truly a privilege to join the Village of Forest View community and to lead a dedicated team of police officers and staff who are committed to serving our residents.

I bring an understanding of the community values that the Village of Forest View shares with growing up in this area and attending Haley School for a couple of years, graduating from Morton West High School and then from Morton College in the Law Enforcement program. I have always been committed to pursuing higher education and advanced training opportunities during my career in law enforcement by earning a bachelor's and a master's degree in criminal social justice from Lewis University in Romeoville, IL, and after graduating from the FBI National Academy (FBINA) Law Enforcement Executive Leadership Development program, I then went on to earn a second Master of Science Degree from DePaul University in Public Service Management.

My law enforcement experience includes being in executive leadership positions over the past fifteen plus years as a chief of police and as a city administrator. During my career, I've had the honor of serving as President of the West Suburban Chiefs of Police Association, serving as the Director of the WESTAF Major Crimes Task Force, and as the Director of MCAT which is our local major crimes task force. My background also includes a wide range of teaching experience in undergraduate and graduate level studies in Criminal Justice and Leadership and Organizational Management. I am currently teaching in the Criminal Justice program at Morton College. I've also had the privilege of teaching various law enforcement courses to law enforcement professionals across the country as a Certified Trainer in Crisis Communications and Critical Incident Management.

My goal as Chief is simple — to build strong relationships in expanding our community outreach programs and youth engagement efforts. Together, in building strong community relationships we can strengthen trust, prevent crime, and make a lasting difference. Over the coming months, I'll be out in the community — attending neighborhood meetings, local events, and community gatherings. PUBLIC WORKS



SNOW REMOVAL/ PARKING BAN

Snow removal is vital to safe driving. **After a snowfall of two inches (2") or more, it is unlawful to park any vehicle, or to permit any vehicle to remain parked on the street until the snow has been removed, and provided that the snowfall has stopped.**

Observe "NO PARKING AFTER 2" SNOWFALL/TOW-AWAY ZONE" signs. The NO PARKING ban WILL be enforced! Cars parked illegally WILL be subject to tow. The Public Works crew works long and hard to keep the Village streets clear and safe. We need and appreciate your cooperation.

GARBAGE CANS

In the event of snow, please do not place garbage/recycling cans in the street.

SHOVELING/SNOW BLOWING



Please do not throw snow back into the street after public works has completed their snow plowing. You innocently may be trying to cause the snow to melt faster, however the newly formed snow mound may create a hazard for unsuspecting drivers. Instead we ask that you use the deflector on your snow blower to direct the snow onto the parkway. Pile it up, do not push it out.

Also, during major, wet snowfalls (only), public works will push aside furrows at the end of driveways which were caused by previous snow plow runs.



SENIOR SNOW REMOVAL ASSISTANCE

Public Works offers snow removal to senior citizens who are disabled, handicapped and/or have severe health problems and have no one else who is able to help them with snow removal. The public works crew will make one shovel width pass from the street to the front door thus providing exit route in an emergency situation. This work will be done *after* all the roads have been cleared first, followed by end of driveways, and then eligible senior sidewalks. Those in need of snow removal must complete an application available at the Village Office.

Sidewalk Snow Removal

Public Works will be cleaning Village sidewalks with our smaller Bobcat and brush attachment for all of our residents. This will only take place after significant snowfalls have finished and the streets have been cleared. ***Please note that parked cars and holiday decorations may result in sections of sidewalks being skipped over.***

WINTERIZE YOUR WATER PIPES

Frozen water pipes are not life-threatening; however, frozen or broken water pipes do cause damage to homes each winter. If pipes in the walls aren't properly insulated, they can freeze and rupture. An eighth-of-an-inch crack in a pipe can release up to 250 gallons of water a day, soaking floors, rugs, and furniture. To prevent the mess and aggravation frozen pipes cause, protect your home by following these simple steps:

BEFORE COLD WEATHER

Locate and insulate pipes most susceptible to freezing – typically those near outer walls, in crawl spaces, or in the attic. Wrap pipes with heat tape (UL approved). Seal any leaks that allow cold air inside where pipes are located. Disconnect garden hoses, shut off and drain water from pipes leading to outside faucets.



WHEN IT'S COLD

Open cabinet doors to allow heat to get at uninsulated pipes under a sink or appliance near an outer wall.

Make sure heat is left on and set no lower than 55 degrees.

If you plan to be away short term, have someone check your house daily to make sure the heat is on to prevent freezing. For a prolonged period of time, drain and shut off the water system (except indoor sprinkling systems).



IF PIPES FREEZE

Make sure you and your family know how to shut off the water if pipes freeze to minimize damage. Call a plumber and contact your insurance agent.

Never attempt to thaw a pipe with an open flame or torch.

Always be careful of the potential for electric shock in and around standing water.

GARBAGE COLLECTION

Garbage and recycling collection will remain the same through the Holidays. Christmas trees will also be collected during regular refuse removal. Trees must be placed at the curb and free of any decorations.



During the winter season, it would be helpful to place garbage cans behind the curb line – not in the street, so the snow plows can effectively clear the streets. We thank you for your cooperation.

SENIOR CITIZEN EXEMPTION

If you turned 65 years of age during the tax year for which you are applying, remember you must complete the Senior Citizen Exemption application in order to receive reduction/savings.

If you have applied for a Senior Citizen Exemption in the past, that will roll over. Senior Citizen Freeze will need to be re-applied for annually.

"HEADS" UP



On occasion, a resident will come to the Village Office and maintain their water bill is "never that high". Immediately, the first thing that is checked is the flushing mechanism inside the toilet water tank. Frequently it reveals the rubber flap or cone is hung-up or did not "seat" properly and allowed the water to flow continuously. As a result, considerable water usage occurred without the resident's awareness, thus the high bill. Consequently, it pays to exercise a "heads" up for faint water flow sounds.

NATIONAL LAW ENFORCEMENT APPRECIATION DAY - JANUARY 9TH

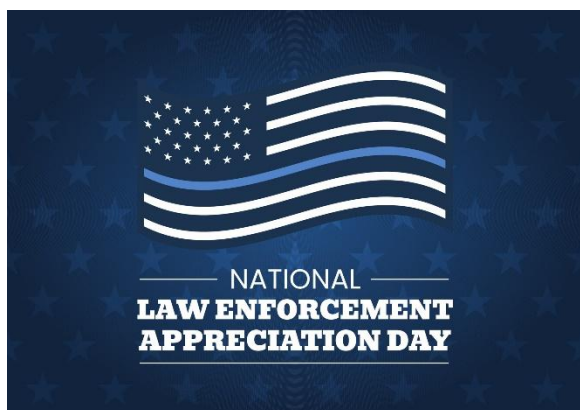

CAN I RECYCLE IT?



You can recycle more than you may think, but maybe not everything that you want. During this holiday season, consider the following guidelines featured in this newsletter's Can I Recycle It?

The **cardboard box** for my new [TV, appliance, monitor, remote-controlled car, etc.] – Yes! The box is definitely recyclable – but the Styrofoam, plastic air pockets, packing peanuts inside are NOT. Please remove these, flatten the box and put the box in recycling, and the non-cardboard packing materials in the trash. Plus, kids of all ages can have fun popping air pockets before tossing them in the trash or taking them to a local grocery store to be recycled (many local grocers offer special collection bins)!

Broken Christmas lights –The Home Depot, Ace Hardware and Lowe's stores often accept these, but specific locations may have different collection policies. Unwanted or broken lights should NOT go in our recycling collection bins.

Christmas trees, holiday wreaths, garlands – Anything plastic should go in the trash. Natural trees, wreaths, and garlands can be collected with yard waste but ALL nonorganic material must be removed. All ornaments, tinsel, wires, ties, ribbons, and/or frames MUST be removed, or it will damage the chipping equipment, as trees are recycled into mulch. If your items are not collected with yard waste collection, one of these items in the tree/wreath/garland may be the answer. Unless you completely strip your natural wreath or garland of these items, you should put them in the trash.

As a reminder, **plastic bags** can **never** go in our recycling bins. This includes the large plastic garbage bag (or other plastic bag) used to contain the recycling materials. Doing so may result in the entire load going into the trash and not being recycled. Simply put your rinsed-out recyclable materials loose in the bin, or you can put them in a paper bag.

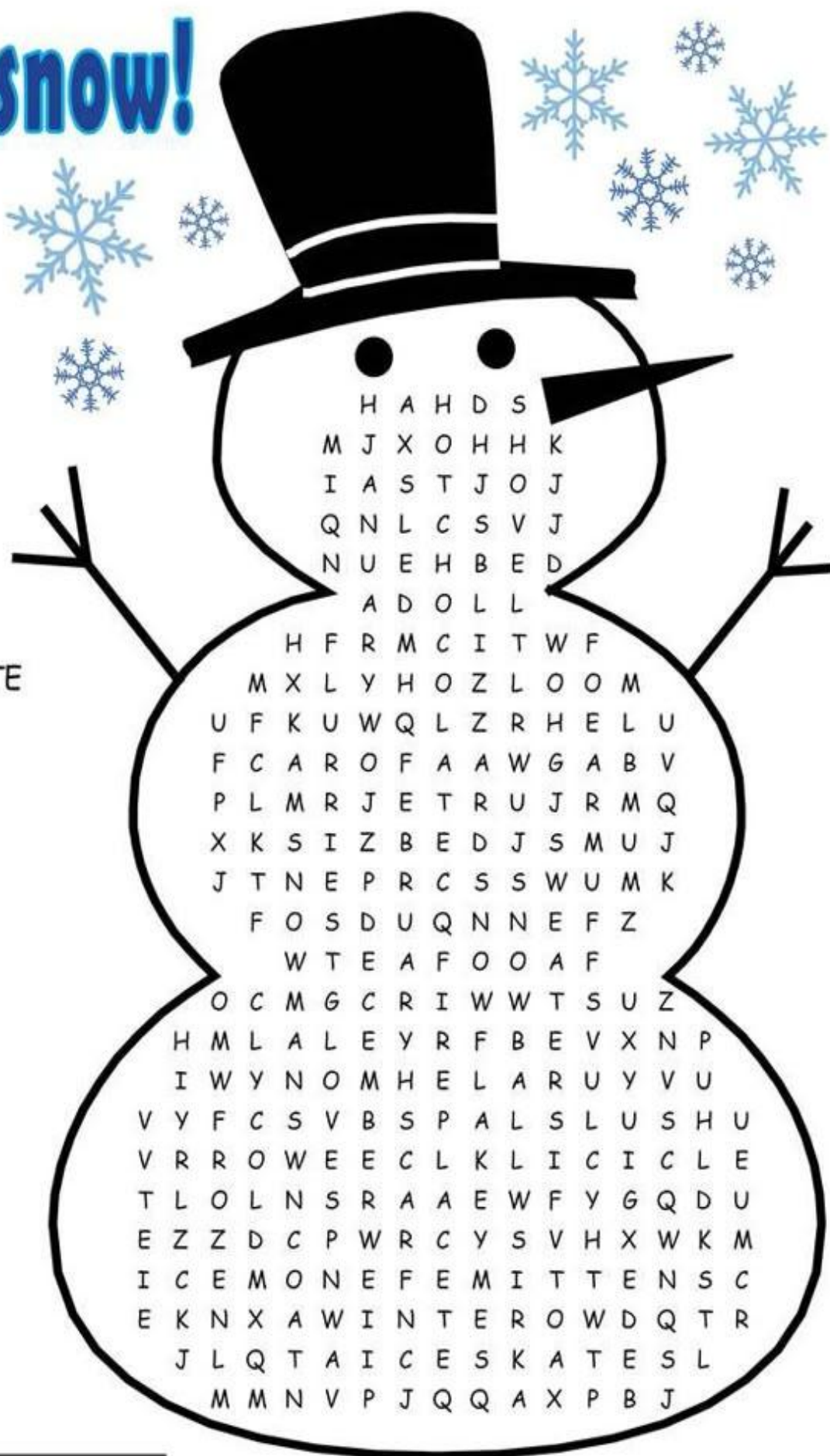
